
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Focus on.... Matt Oldfield author visit

Class reviews

Year 5/6

Year 5 & 6 have been working hard to ensure they can persuade other children in KS2 that their chosen animal is the most important one in the world - they have all worked hard to find interesting facts and use persuasive techniques. Now to prepare for the scary part - presenting their speech to other classes! We are also coming to the end of our very exciting class reader *High Rise Mystery* and will soon find out who killed Hugo; the children have certainly developed their detective skills throughout the novel and used evidence to who the killer is, their motive and method!

Year 4/5



This week we have certainly started to feel Christmassy.
Anthony Horowitz class have been opening their puzzle advent calendar and completing a daily problem-solving question. Nothing says Christmas like problem-solving. We have also just finished our food bank leaflets which are all looking incredible. The students

worked really hard to create a persuasive leaflet encouraging people to make donations to their local food bank. Finishing the leaflets was a great

accomplishment but it also means we can finish the term with some Christmas poetry. For the run up to Christmas we will be looking across to the Emerald Isle for inspiration as we begin writing some hilarious, Christmas limericks.

In Year 4 Science we have continued to investigate electricity through using electrical circuits. This week students created their very own switches using just some cardboard, paperclips and pins. They then investigated what would happen to the circuit if the switch was opened and closed. The real exciting buzz came when we combined this new knowledge with another electrical component, buzzers, to design an intruder alarm which we will make and test next week.

Year 3/4

Last week in history, we delved deeper into WW2. We had the exciting



opportunity to do a video call with a WW2 survivor (Miss Bourne's Nan). She introduced herself as Nanny Iris! The children enjoyed listening to her experiences of being evacuated, hiding in a bomb shelter and rationing. The children then had the chance to ask historical questions about Nanny Iris's experiences. Year 3/4 asked questions such as:

- How long were you evacuated for?
- What did you do when bombs were dropped?
- How did you feeling being evacuated?
- What food did you have in your rations?
- What was it like inside your bomb shelter?
- What it is the scariest thing that happened?



The children were given the chance to see the weighed-out rations that people during WW2 had for a week and were shocked to see how few sweets they received! They were amazed that Nanny Iris was given a green cloak to wear to school so that her and her sister were less visible to enemy planes. On the way to school one morning, Iris and her sister Mary had to hide from a stray enemy plane in the hedgerow of a field!

Year 2

We've been busy bees in Year 2, making the Christmas performance as good as we can for you. We cannot wait to show you all of the hard work that has gone into the performance. In Maths. we've started to focus on shape, looking at 2D shape properties. In English. the children have impressed me with their use of past tense, writing a recount about the Great fire of London. In other areas we've starting learning about living things in Science, made Christmas decorations for the school in DT and continue to impress with our

dancing in PE.

Year 1







Important update on Scarlet fever and Strep

There has been a recent national increase in notifications of scarlet fever to the UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA), above seasonal expected levels.

Signs and symptoms of scarlet fever

Scarlet fever is a common childhood infection caused by *Streptococcus* pyogenes, or group A Streptococcus (GAS). It is not usually serious, but should be treated with antibiotics to reduce the risk of complications (such as pneumonia) and spread to others. The early symptoms of scarlet fever include sore throat, headache, fever, nausea and vomiting. After 12 to 48 hours, the characteristic red, pinhead rash develops, typically first appearing on the chest and stomach, then rapidly spreading to other parts of the body, and giving the skin a sandpaper-like texture. The scarlet rash may be harder to spot on darker skin, although the 'sandpaper' feel should be present. Patients typically have flushed cheeks and be pale around the mouth. This may be accompanied by a bright red red 'strawberry' tongue.

If you think you, or your child, might have scarlet fever:

contact your GP or NHS 111 as soon as possible

- make sure that you or your child take(s) the full course of any antibiotics prescribed. Although you or your child will feel better soon after starting the course of antibiotics, you must complete the course to ensure that you do not carry the bacteria in your throat after you have recovered
- stay at home, away from nursery, school or work for at least 24 hours after starting the antibiotic treatment, to avoid spreading the infection

You can help stop the spread of infection through frequent hand washing and by not sharing eating utensils, clothes, bedding and towels. All contaminated tissues should be disposed of immediately.

Invasive Group A Strep (iGAS)

The same bacteria which cause scarlet fever can also cause a range of other types of infection such as skin infections (impetigo) and sore throat. In very rare cases, the bacteria can get into the bloodstream and cause an illness called invasive group A strep (iGAS). Whilst still very uncommon, there has been an increase in iGAS cases this year, particularly in children under 10 years old. It is very rare for children with scarlet fever to develop iGAS infection.

As a parent, you should trust your own judgement.

Contact NHS 111 or your GP if:

- your child is getting worse
- your child is feeding or eating much less than normal
- your child has had a dry nappy for 12 hours or more or shows other signs of dehydration
- your baby is under 3 months and has a temperature of 38C, or is older than 3 months and has a temperature of 39C or higher
- your baby feels hotter than usual when you touch their back or chest, or feels sweaty
- your child is very tired or irritable

Call 999 or go to A&E if:

- your child is having difficulty breathing you may notice grunting noises or their tummy sucking under their ribs
- there are pauses when your child breathes
- your child's skin, tongue or lips are blue
- your child is floppy and will not wake up or stay awake

Stop the spread

During periods of high incidence of scarlet fever, there may also be an increase in outbreaks in schools, nurseries and other childcare settings. Children and adults with suspected scarlet fever should stay off nursery / school / work until 24 hours after the start of appropriate antibiotic treatment. Good hygiene practice such as hand washing remains the most important step in preventing and controlling spread of infection.
