

Year 5/6



It has been a creative start to the term, beginning our 'Express Yourself' art journey, which involved designing an outfit to show our personalities - we have quite a selection of footballers and fashionistas! Year 4/5

In Anthony Horowitz class we have dived straight into our new English topic, biographies. We will be taking a look into the work and life of Banksy with the aim to create our very own Banksy biography. We have spent time exploring street art and graffiti, taking a virtual tour of the East Side Gallery in Berlin. From this, we



have been debating whether graffiti is art or vandalism which has led to some very different opinions. We have explored a book all about Banksy and have started to investigate some of the key pieces of vocabulary looking to define these words and find synonyms which we can use in our writing.

On Wednesday we started our new computing topic where we have been using software to record our own audio, we started off with recording some knock knock jokes, there was a very rude interrupting cow in lots of the recordings! Once we have got to grips with the software, we will be working to record our very own small podcast.

Year 3/4

Year 3 and 4 have had a great start to 2023! They have been learning all about synonyms in English and creating fact families in Maths. It has wonderful to see them enjoying their fantastic Science unit too – they learnt about the different types of rock through a demonstration from Miss Bourne using Starburst sweets – there was certainly lots of 'awe and wonder' in the room! Well done everyone!

Year 2

It's been a lively start to 2023 in Year 2 with the introduction of our new book in English, 'The Disgusting Sandwich'. It has been lovely to welcome the children back to school. The children were tricked into thinking I'd eaten a disgusting sandwich and then enjoyed exploring the brilliant vocabulary the book has to offer. We had an amazing lesson on extending vocabulary related to all things gruesome and disgusting!

In other areas of the curriculum, we are focusing on 3D shapes and their proprieties in Maths, Food from around the UK in Geography, Dodgeball and Dance in PE, along with much more.





Library Corner

Very excitingly, Thameside are going to be taking part in the Oxfordshire Book Awards this year. This involves reading the shortlisted books and then voting on which ones we think are the best. There are two categories – Best Picture Book and Best Junior Novel – and I'll be sharing the texts with you in the newsletters.





'Julia and the Shark' by local author **Kiran Millwood Hargrave**, illustrated by her husband **Tom de Freston**, is a very moving story about a girl who moves to a remote Scottish island for the summer so that her mother can look for an elusive species of shark. A fantastic story, with twists and turns, which also

explores what it's like to be a young carer for a parent with mental health struggles. Highly recommended for Y5+. (AR Book Level 4.8 / 32,000 words)

'Mia Makes a Meadow' by Rachel Lawston is a lovely picture book about a girl who re-wilds a garden outside her block of flats. How will her neighbours react to this, however, especially Erik who has always kept things neat and tidy?

We have copies of both of these books in school for the children to use.

Accelerated Reader

The children in KS2 are continuing to quiz on their finished books and have now read a combined 5.6 million words! There is strong competition at the top of the leaderboard, with Grace, Logan T, Finn, Stanley, Jacob, Thomas, Matthew, Haroon, Sarika and Amoy currently in the top ten spaces!



Strep A and Handwashing advice

It's important to minimise the spread of infection in schools and other education and childcare settings as much as possible, so we ask your support with

- If a child is unwell and has a fever, they should stay home from school or nursery until they feel better, and the fever has resolved.
- Teach children the importance of good hand hygiene, practice regular handwashing with soap and warm water.
- Catch coughs and sneezes in tissues then bin them is another simple way to help stop illness from spreading.

- Adults should also try to stay home when unwell and if they do have to go
 out, wear a face covering. When unwell don't visit healthcare settings or
 visit vulnerable people unless urgent.
- Remember that flu vaccination is still available for all eligible groups and is the best protection against the virus.



It is also essential that everyone washes their hands more often, using soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Hand washing with soap employs mechanical action that loosens bacteria and viruses from the skin, rinsing them into the drain. Drying hands afterwards makes the skin less hospitable to the virus.


Hand sanitiser can be effective if soap is not available or the situation makes using

soap less feasible (i.e. when outside).
