Year 5/6

In English, we have looked at controversial issues throughout the term, chosen a topic we are passionate about, and produced balanced arguments to inform our audience - the children have chosen some really interesting topics, which have even challenged their own views! Year 4/5

Year 5 had the very exciting opportunity to take part in a Bikeability course on Tuesday. This involved a service and check of their bikes, before practising skills on the playground. They finally got to take to the roads and put into place their new skills, attempting to navigate some pretty complicated junctions in a safe manner. This involved some serious multi tasking!

The group, consisting of Tilly, Jaymes, Sonny, Lilly-Ann and Lochlan all passed and received their certificates for their incredible hard work. We received glowing feedback from the instructors who said the children were all fantastic. A great way to represent our school and make all of Team Thameside proud!

Year 3/4

Year 3/4 have turned into a group of journalists and editors!

They have worked really hard this term learning about writing a web-based news report. They learnt about headlines, captions, introductions, the 5 Ws (who, what, why, where and when) and direct and indirect speech. We looked at features of online news articles and did a slow write to produce a web-based news report about the discovery of a WW2 bomb on the school field. Then, we edited our final report before publishing it on Microsoft Word. Don't be alarmed - this was imaginary! I was blown away by the children's finished articles! They have shown resilience and reflective skills to achieve this and it has left me wondering who might go Unexploded WW2 Bomb Found On A School Field

In Maths, the children have now finished using money, learning how to give change and identify the best coins/notes to use for an amount. This area of Maths really is tricky and the more exposure you can give to coins/notes really will help with long-term retention of the skill. We are now focusing on

multiplication and division; so far, we have recognised and shared equally.

In Computing, we had a Bee-bot race using coding and programming to instruct our Beebots' path. We continue to look at animals in Science and have been making our final piece of Artwork in the design of Henri Rousseau in Art

with your children and we look forward to welcoming the children back to school after half term.


Year 1

to add to the police report they wrote, which was posted on Tuesday.


On Wednesday P.C. Brown wrote

Attendance and Punctuality update





This week, we're recommending a whole series of books: **'You Choose'** by the fantastic children's author and illustrator, **Nick Sharratt**.



These bright and colourful books are wonderful for sharing with your child. Each page invites you to choose from a whole double-page spread of things, such as outfits, houses, food or a place to go on an adventure. There's no right or wrong answer and you can make a different decision every time you look at the book!



This series is brilliant for developing children's language and imagination. **Top Tips**: sit somewhere comfortable (blankets and cushions are great!) and look at the pages together. Talk about the different colours, etc and listen to your child's choices. Share what you'd choose too! Maybe make up a little story or ask 'I wonder...' questions.



Parent Governor Nominations

We will soon have a vacancy for a parent governor to join our LGB.

Becoming a governor is a very rewarding and worthwhile experience. Effective governors do not need expertise in education but do need to be committed to their school, willing to ask questions and offer appropriate challenge and support.

All governors are expected to:

- attend termly (roughly) evening meetings of the LGB
- attend development sessions which are usually once a term
- visit the school formally for monitoring purposes

Governors also need to be able to work as an enthusiastic member of the governing body team with the aim of raising and maintaining high educational standards for all children. Governors are asked to act with integrity, honesty and objectivity and at all times in the best interests of the school. The prime focus of the LGB is to develop the strategic direction of the school, be accountable to stakeholders and to ensure that financial resources are spent appropriately. Governors also have a number of opportunities to access training to develop and enhance their knowledge and skills. It is important to note that governors are elected to bring the experience of that individual as a member of the LGB. Once elected, parent governors are a representative parent but not a delegate. This means they are not expected to report back to parents on any matters relating to the school or LGB without prior consent from the governing body

Nomination requires that each candidate provide a brief personal statement of up to 200 words in length, covering a little information about the candidate and why they would like to be a governor. Should there be more than one nomination for the vacancy, there will be a parent ballot and all personal statements will be shared with parents, to help them decide how to vote.
