Another week of hard work, resilience and collaboration! Miss Clark gave us some tricky situations to work our way out of - trying to cross a river of lava using a piece of paper was not as easy as it sounds and as for the man trying to get the chicken, fox and corn across a river, we really had




Reception


In Reception we have had a great start to the term, carrying on where we left



'We're Going to Find the Monster!' by Malorie Blackman is a really colourful and imaginative picture book about two children who are going on an adventure. A great book to read-aloud with your family as you follow Charlie and Eddie to try and find the monster. But who is the monster? (AR Book Level 2.9 / 453 words)

'The Night Bus Hero' by Onjali Q. Rauf is a recommended read for KS2. It's a fantastic book all about a boy who always gets into trouble. However, after playing a prank on an old man who lives in the park, he wants to prove to everyone that he can be a hero. This book shows bravery and determination and is well worth a read! (AR Book Level 5.3 / 54,932 words). This is one of Mrs Youngman's favourite ever books!

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Word of the week!

Developing vocabulary is a key element of our curriculum at Thameside – each week we will be sharing some new words on the newsletter you to discuss and share with your children!

One will be English themed and another Maths themed!

English word of the week - UNIQUE

It means, to be one of a kind.

We are all unique in our own way.

Synonyms: individual, special.

Antonyms: same.

Etymology: it comes from the Latin 'unus' meaning one.

Math word of the week - COMMON

It means to be shared or done often. Belonging to two or more quantities.

Find the common factors of 20 and 45.

Synonyms: regular, frequent.

Antonyms: rare, unusual.

What is the highest common factor of 16 and 24?

Factors of 16: 1 2 4 8 16

The highest common factor is 8

Factors of 24: 1 2 3 4 6(8)12 24
