We are exhausted!

Over the past two weeks, alongside lots of exciting enrichment activities, we have been immersed in the completion of assessments; this year our Writing assessment judgements in Year 6 were externally moderated by another Oxfordshire Headteacher, and we were delighted that he agreed with our judgements.

This week Year 4 got our results from our Multiplication Check; the results across the board were great. Everyone made progress from our first attempt on the Times Table Rock Stars unofficial check. It really proves how the ongoing commitment and practice within the TTRS program really makes a huge difference. Well done to all the Year 4s who took part, your hard work paid off! Keep up the great work!!

We have loved sharing the events and learning of our children via our social media pages. However, please can I take this opportunity to remind parents

about conduct when posting – we have had huge amounts of positive feedback about how much parents and carers love the new pages and enjoy seeing the photos of what our children have been up to. However; can we remind parents and carers that if you have any queries or concerns, to raise them via the correct channels with school directly and not via comments on the posts. Sadly, if the pages are not used respectfully, comments will be silenced. Thank you for your support with this.

Strike action reminder:

Just a reminder, that due to NEU strike action, that Reception and Year 4/5 will be CLOSED on Wednesday 5th and Friday 7th July – except to those with an EHCP or open to social care support. Sports Day will therefore take place on Thursday 6th July – timings have been shared with parents and carers.

We will be sharing information about next year's teachers and classes at the start of July when reports will be sent home along with information about staffing for the new academic year- we have created a 'new style' end of year report this year, which aims to capture children's achievements and successes really clearly for parents and carers. We hope that you like it! As always, there will be an opportunity to provide your feedback about your child's report and chat to us if you have any questions or queries.

School Day

We are now able to confirm that the consultation to extend the school day has been completed and as such, the school day will be extended to **3.15pm** from September 2023.

There are also some changes to the Nursery day as detailed in the letter sent out last term; we will send a full communication about the new timings later this term to remind parents and carers.

Year group changes

We are also delighted that due to increasing numbers at Thameside, **we will be moving to SINGLE YEAR GROUP classes in Key Stage 2 (Years 3-6) from September 2023 (<u>so there will be no more mixed classes</u>) - we are in the process of adjusting our curriculum and arranging staffing, and will be inviting you to some welcome sessions at the end of the year to meet your child's new teacher (watch this space for dates!). This is a really exciting development for** Thameside – we do have spaces in most year groups, so please do spread the word!

Support for parents

Helping your child to share what they have done in the school day with you.

We often hear from parents that their child is reluctant to talk about what they have done in the school day. This could be for many reasons but usually because they are tired from the school day and just want to switch off.

These are tips adapted from an article by a speech and language therapist to support you in talking with your child about their day.

- 1. Provide a good model: briefly outline your own day's activities. Demonstrate use of time concepts, such as 'first...then'. Explain how activities made you feel and why. Hearing a good model of how to share news will support the young person to understand how to share their own day.
- 2. Use visuals/props: Draw a picture to go with your 'first...then' activities for the day and encourage your child to do one.
- 3. Use questions wisely: open questions are a great way of encouraging expression, but some children will find them challenging to answer. They may struggle to work out what it is you want to know and give you a huge amount of detail or no information at all i.e. "What did you do today?" "Nothing". Try asking questions that give the child more guidance about what you want to know, e.g. "What was the best thing you did today?" or "What made you smile?"
- 4. Adapt your questions to the child's level, e.g. "Who did you see?" "Where did you go?" "How did that feel?"
- 5. Try something different: an alternative to sharing what they did in the school day would be to encourage your child to talk about what they DID NOT do. For example, "Today I did NOT go to Mars in a rocket, and I did NOT share my picnic lunch with a Martian". Let their imaginations run
