Focus on.... Equality and diversity

Equality

At Thameside we pride ourselves on being a welcoming and inclusive school. For us, equality means that everyone is able to participate and feel welcome and

safe in the activities of our school. This includes pupils, parents, staff, governors and visitors. Everyone should be able to achieve the best possible outcomes as a result of their participation. We believe that equality should permeate all aspects of school life and is the responsibility of all members of the school and community

Diversity

At our school diversity means acknowledging that there are differences between people that should be recognised, respected and celebrated. We promote respect of each other's differences and identities via our school values. We celebrate and raise awareness of diversity in the school and in the wider community and believe that teaching children about diversity prepares them for life as a caring and respectful individual.

We wanted to take a moment to share some of the actions and work that we do at TS to promote these important aspects:

- ✓ Our school value of respect and our school rule of 'showing kindness' permeates all we do
- An assembly programme that focusses on key social issues and celebrates inspirational individuals.
- Representation across our clubs and pupil leadership is carefully tracked -where families may ned support to enable their children to attend, this is offered. We have also worked hard to secure grants to enable all children to access curriculum enrichment (e.g. yoga and bike classes)
- Our PSHE scheme covers topics such as discrimination and protected characteristics



✓ A diverse book spine that shows representation across a variety of themes and authors

In our Reading Spine, some of the books have race as a key part of the text, such as 'Proudest Blue', which gives us an explicit opportunity to talk about questions of diversity and our Thameside values of kindness and respect.

A key piece of research which has informed our text choices is the 'Reflecting Realities' report from the CLPE which describes the positive impact on children's identities from seeing themselves in the texts they encounter at school and many of our reading spine books are on their recommended reading lists.

In addition to racial diversity, we also consider different socio-economic backgrounds, family set-ups, disabilities and other important aspects of children's lives. Examples for these books include 'What happened to You?' and 'It's a No Money Day' which again give valuable opportunities to discuss EDI matters with the children.

Our reading spine is a constantly evolving document, responding to the needs of the Thameside children and trying to make links as often as possible to other curriculum areas. I'm always really open to suggestions of books to include / share with the children, so please do drop me a line at kdaniell@vale-academy.org if you have any great recommendations!

Inclusion and SEND update – sleep advice and



support

At any given time up to 40% of adults and 50% of children (this rises to 80% with a SEND diagnosis) have difficulties with their sleep. Yet in a recent survey, almost 60% of adults felt there was a lack of support for sleep issues. Sleep problems can leave people feeling isolated and lonely.

There is a free helpline, run by trained sleep advisors, many of whom are specialists in working with SEND. They can talk to young people directly, or parents (they can also talk to adults, including older people, about their sleep issues).

The helpline is open 5 times a week, Monday, Tuesday, Thursday evenings 7-9pm, and Monday, Wednesday mornings 9-11am. The number is 03303 530 541.

Year 6

Year 6, have really enjoyed learning about light this week. The children designed an experiment to answer the question 'Which material reflects the most light?'

The children decided that 'the smoother the material the more light it reflects.'



Year 5

Another busy couple of weeks for Year 5! We have completed our scripts with Oxford Playhouse, which are now with the production team - our words will be put into action ready for performances next year. We have also been very fortunate to have another 'special guest' teacher this week - Mr Campbell - who has been teaching more Solar System themed music!

Over the next couple of weeks, we will be getting more festive and fun in all our learning activities - there will be some special cards coming home as a result of our DT work and an alternative version of 'A Night before Christmas' will be shared with family and friends at home.

Year 4

Another busy few weeks in Year 4 Farook Class. With the end of term rapidly approaching, we have been working towards our hybrid instruction texts where we will be explaining how to mummify a tomato. Before we start our final write, we have been working hard to develop our self-evaluation skills. We have been learning how to check our spelling, proofread effectively to check grammar, edit and improve our punctuation and explore how we can develop more interesting vocabulary. We are all excited to see how this translates to our final writing pieces. In Computing this term, we have been learning all about photo editing. Over the past few weeks, we have looked at rotating and cropping images, changing colours and effects and cloning and removing elements of photos. It has not been an easy unit but I have been very impressed with the computing skills students have been able to display and remember.

Year 3

Y3 Percival Class have had another great week and enjoyed another specialist Science session with the Trust Science Lead, Mrs Boaz. They have been

learning about how light can be reflected and how darkness is the absence of light. Can they find more reflective surfaces at home? We have also started a new book (which they love!) called 'The Dog That Saved Christmas' by Nicola Davies. The main character, Jake, has autism and finds Christmas rather overwhelming. We will be learning more about the autistic spectrum and how to support our friends who have autism. In

Year 2



Year 2 have been busy practising for the Christmas Nativity (tickets for this came home last week, please do remember to bring your tickets on the day!).

The children have grown in confidence so much and have really enjoyed learning the songs and actions. We are so proud of them all.



In Maths, we have continued our learning about shapes, focusing on 3D shapes and their properties. The children have amazed us with their correct use of the terminology (faces, vertices, edges) and they can name a variety of both 3D and 2D shapes. They all had a go at making their own 3D shape bracelet with repeating patterns today. We had some great creations!

Year 1

In Year one we have been very busy getting ready for Christmas.

In our R.E lessons, Mrs Youngman has been teaching us about the Christian meaning of Christmas and how Jesus was born in a stable. We have been learning about the gifts he was given and have thought about what we might give Jesus if he were born today.

We have had great fun rehearing our nativity play 'Baarmy Bethlehem' which we are performing to our friends and families next week.

We have also been busy writing to Father Christmas! We are expecting a reply any day now. We are sure we are on the good list!



Reception

It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas in Superworms class, log in to Tapestry to see what Christmas bits we've been up to. Thank you as always for your engagement on Tapestry; it really does help link the learning with the children. The children have been learning about the Christmas story, retelling through puppets and showing they can collaborate together.



This week we've focused on the children's climbing and balance as part of the prime area - Physical development. The children loved balancing and make assault courses. We have also written to Santa to ask him for one toy we would like for Christmas. Finally we've been having a daily visitor from the North Pole - Jingles, the elf, has been spreading kindness with his daily kind challenges.

Nursery

Christmas has landed in Nursery! We have been busy making Christmas cards for our families and writing Christmas cards for our friends, family, Father Christmas and even the Gruffalo! We have been enjoying snowy tuff trays and wrapping up our own presents. Last week, the children arrived for the day, and it was transformed into a Christmas wonderland. 



You must still apply even if your child already attends a nursery attached to the school.



to message a school health nurse



We aim to reply to you within one working day and you should get an immediate message back to confirm we have received your text. Texts will only be seen between 9am and 5pm, Monday-Friday excluding Bank Holidays. If you need help before you hear back from us contact your GP, nearest walk in centre or dial 111. Our text number does not receive voice calls or MMS picture messages. Your messages are stored and can be seen by other health care staff who follow the same confidentiality rules. We support messaging from UK mobile numbers only (which does not include messages sent from landlines, international mobile numbers and some 'number masking' mobile apps). We might inform other relevant professionals if we were concerned about your safety, but we would usually speak to you first. To prevent the health professional from sending messages to you, text STOP to our number. Messages are charged at your usual rates.



Locality and Community Support Service



Dear parents,

My name is Sophia Lazarou-West and I work for the Locality Community Support Service (LCSS) and will be the link worker for Thameside Primary School.

As the school's link worker, I offer support and guidance to school staff, can refer and signpost to external agencies and ensure all children and families, where needed, are offered Early Help. This might look like a Strengths and Needs conversation being had with families or attending a team around the family meeting. The aim of LCSS is to ensure families have their support needs met by agencies within the community so that support is offered in a co-ordinated way, at the right time to make sure worries don't become bigger for children and their families. This could include support from school staff, school health nurse, a GP, the voluntary sector, anyone that offers a service to children and families.
