Dear Parents and Carers,

The whole school was calm and purposeful....some children were fizzing with excitement as we visited on a day when Radley College had brought animals from their zoo to share with Years 3 and 4, and Oxford Playhouse were working with Year 5 on their playscripts performances.

Paul's conversation with a Reception Child also made us all smile:

A group of the boys were keen to demonstrate to me that they could count to 100. They were all confident and outgoing. When we finished talking, they decided that I would need help to get up from the very low chair. They joined hands to pull me to my feet. They had clearly taken on board the Thameside policy of kindness to others.



Focus on....

Attendance – EVERY school day counts!

Attendance continues to be a huge priority for us at Thameside, as in all schools nationally – thank you to all of our parents and carers for supporting us in ensuring that all of our children attend school regularly.

Good attendance is important because statistics show that pupils with good attendance have higher attainment in school and children with attendance above 96% make better progress socially and academically. With the focus and development on the curriculum that has taken place at Thameside, children who are absent are likely to develop gaps in their knowledge over time. For our younger children, both attendance and punctuality are doubly important as they move straight into their phonics teaching after the register has been taken.

As your children will tell you, we always aim for **96%** or more; we also analyse all children's attendance carefully in line with our attendance policy. At the moment our termly attendance is **92.3%** so we still have some work to do together to increase this figure! Teachers and Inclusion Staff are contacting

families who are below this figure to offer support to increase their child's attendance.

The table below demonstrates how much school children miss if they are absent and it is surprising how this adds up. We are fully aware that the circumstances around Covid-19 and subsequent other illnesses that children have contracted are mainly responsible and unavoidable for the majority of absences.

If your child misses	That equals	Which is	over 13 years schooling
1 day every 2 weeks	20 days per year	4 weeks per year	Nearly 1 ½ years
1 day per week	40 days per year	8 weeks per year	Over 2 ½ years
2 days per week	80 days per year	16 weeks per year	Over 5 years
3 days per week	120 days per year	24 weeks per year	Over 8 years

Finally, as you may have seen, this term, we also had a visit from the Oxfordshire County Council attendance team who were looking specifically at children arriving late to school – thank you to those parents who spoke to the attendance officer. The County Attendance Team will continue with their unannounced visits throughout the term. Being on time in school is essential to ensure that children can settle well into school and do not miss learning time – every time your child is on time, they will also earn a raffle ticket in our weekly class raffle! A reminder that school starts promptly at 8.40am.

Personal Development update

This term our pupil parliament met with Mrs Youngman to discuss the school development plan – they came up with some amazing ideas for the future, including:

- Reading Buddies and playtime buddies across the school (Mrs Youngman is going to look into getting some special hi vis vests!)
- Sports Leaders supporting PE lessons as role models
- Local community litter picking
- A school recycling project 'drive'
- More sports equipment for the playground Mrs Youngman has asked our lovely PTA to support
- Mental Health ambassadors Sonny and Evaldo

In other personal development news.....

- Oxford Playhouse sessions in Year 5 have been going fantastically the children are certainly budding actors and actresses!

Class learning reviews



This term, we have been working on our Science Fair project where Miss Bourne gave us a real-life issue which we had to design a solution to. Our

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
real-life issue was, 'How can we clear oil spills from the oceans?' We used our

When finished, these are going to help us remember key knowledge from Geography about the poles, Equator and continents. Our afternoon of fun activities concluded with some fruit platters and circle time. Who knew Year 3 could eat so much melon?!



Year 2

Year 2 have finished writing their own instructions on how to make a disgusting sandwich. We are now just waiting to see which recipe Mr Dineen thinks is the most disgusting of them all! 

We aim to reply to you within one working day and you should get an immediate message back to confirm we have received your text. Texts will only be seen between 9am and 5pm, Monday-Friday excluding Bank Holidays. If you need help before you hear back from us contact your GP, nearest walk in centre or dial 111. Our text number does not receive voice calls or MMS picture messages. Your messages are stored and can be seen by other health care staff who follow the same confidentiality rules.

We support messaging from UK mobile numbers only (which does not include messages sent from landlines, international mobile numbers and some 'number masking' mobile apps). We might inform other relevant professionals if we were concerned about your safety, but we would usually speak to you first. To prevent the health professional from sending messages to you, text STOP to our number. Messages are charged at your usual rates.

Let children know you're listening

A safeguarding resource to help you show children and young people that, whatever they want to share, you're ready to listen.

There are three simple directions to remember...

> Show you care, help them open up

Give them your full attention and keep your body language open and encouraging. Be compassionate, be understanding and reassure them their feelings are important. Phrases like "you've shown such courage today" help.

> Take your time, slow down

Respect pauses and don't interrupt them – let them go at their own pace. Recognise and respond to their body language. And remember that it may take several conversations for them to share what's happened to them.

> Show you understand, reflect back

Make it clear you're interested in what they're telling you. Reflect back what they've said to check your understanding – and use their language to show it's their experience.
