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## School development update



This term we have continued to work hard to make our school even more special – our focus has been on developing our curriculum and we were delighted to welcome a team of leaders from the Vale Academy trust



this week to provide some feedback on the work we have done so far this year, particularly linked to Reading and Geography.

We were delighted with the comments and wanted to share some of them with you:

- There is a 'buzz' and 'sparkle' in school alongside a clear shared vision
- Children spoke positively about their learning and could explain their 'journey' using their books
- Classrooms were calm, purposeful and ordered; staff have warm and nurturing relationships with pupils
- There is a culture of celebration and praise

### Focus on.. assemblies!

At Thameside, our assembly programme is a key part of how we support our children to be kind and respectful citizens, who can go out and make a positive difference in the world. As part of our weekly assemblies, children experience a wide range of opportunities to discuss and share ideas about important and current topics.



On Tuesdays, our assemblies are led by Mrs Youngman, Mrs Putt and Miss Polley. The aim of these assemblies is to provide an opportunity for children to learn about a wide range of themes and issues affecting their lives today. We have already covered assemblies linked to keeping our bodies safe, World Mental Health Day, Black History Month and our 'Learning to Learn' focus of Perseverance.

We have been hugely impressed with the mature views and ideas that the children have shared and can't wait for the term ahead!

## Class reviews of the term so far!

## Year 5/6

Year 5 and 6 began a new English learning journey this week with a focus on persuasion; we have been very impressed with their skills in this area! We have learnt a wide range of vocabulary, and the children are ready to include this in their final pieces later this term. We have also started to investigate our topic of conflict and have spent time discussing the importance of remembrance.

### **Year 4/5**

Last week, we had a really exciting launch of our new reading and writing book; The Great Food Bank Heist. A lady called Hilary, who volunteers at the food bank, came to talk to us about their fabulous work. Since then, we have



been focusing on vocabulary and emotive language as part of our English lessons, as we will be using persuasive writing to create a leaflet all about the local food bank.

In Science we have started our new topic: Electricity! It has really 'sparked' children's

curiosity. Students worked in groups to create Venn diagrams classifying different household appliances and whether or not they were electrical, nonelectrical, battery powered or a combination. This week we had a go at creating simple circuits. It was fantastic to see what the students remembered from the Abingdon school workshop!

### Year 3/4



In Year 3/4, we have been learning all about magnets and forces this week! We have been so impressed with the fantastic questions that children have asked to further their knowledge: **Are big magnets more powerful than small ones?** 

Are magnets just as powerful underwater as they are through the air?

How many sheets of paper can a fridge magnet hold?

### Year 2

It has been lovely to have the children back at school over the last few weeks. Year Two continue to shine and try their best in all we do. We've started looking at the Gunpowder plot and if Guy Fawkes was a hero or villain. The children think he's a villain! In Maths, we continue to add and subtract. We have also been busy preparing a Fire safety poster for you, so watch this space!

### Year 1



We love English in Year 1! This week we have been using magnetic letters to help with our spelling and we have read words and matched them to pictures. We have also written some sentences to describe ourselves.





### Reception

This week Reception have started thinking about things that happened long ago - in particular, dinosaurs!! We read 'Stomp,

Dinosaur, Stomp!' and then practised moving like dinosaurs moved, as well as doing lots of dinosaur crafts.





#### Nursery

Nursery have been super creative since returning to school. We have been exploring colours and patterns and have created rainbows, collages, fireworks, flags, bunting and more. Finnlay worked so hard on creating a huge rocket. This was over a few days; he used lots of different materials and painted it too!

## **Library Corner**

Following on from the theme of remembrance, this edition our recommendations are books which sensitively explore the theme of remembering lost loved ones. Bereavement can feel like a tricky thing to talk to children about; sharing a book together can be one way to start a conversation. We have copies of these recommendations in school – part of a growing mini-library of books which deal with all sorts of complex emotions and issues, including anger, disability, low income and neuro-diversity.



**'The Heart and the Bottle' by Oliver Jeffers** is a touching picture book about a little girl who put her heart in a bottle to protect it after suffering a painful loss. After a time, however, she meets another girl who reminds her of what she has been missing by retreating into herself and the story ends on a hopeful note. (AR: Book Level 2.5 / 278 words / Age 5+)

**'Mum's Jumper' by Jayde Perkin** is another simple but thoughtful picture book about how you can feel after losing a loved one, as a little girl and her dad make sense of the loss of their mum/wife. These tricky emotions are dealt with sensitively and the book is a great springboard for talking about how we remember those who have passed.

**'You Will Be Okay'** is an information book written **by Julie Stokes**. She is a clinical psychologist who founded 'Winston's Wish', a childhood bereavement charity. I can't recommend this book enough for anyone going through a tricky time with loss or seeking to support a friend or family member. Written particularly for young people, it explains – in an easy-to understand way – the different stages and emotions of grief. There are also helpful practical ideas to try to and a brilliant list of other resources/websites to access.

## **Accelerated Reader**

A big 'well done' to everyone who has quizzed on a book since our last newsletter. The total read by Years 3-6 has now shot past **two million words**, which is an incredible achievement!
